### **REASONS FOR ORDER**

(Delivered orally from the Bench at Toronto, Ontario, on March 12, 1997, as edited)

### McKEOWN J.

This matter came for hearing before me at Toronto on March 12, 1997.

The appellant appeals the decision of the Citizenship Judge dated May 28, 1996, refusing his application for Canadian citizenship on the basis that he did not have an adequate knowledge of Canada and the responsibilities and privileges of citizenship, as required by paragraph 5(1)(e) of the Citizenship Act (the Act). The Citizenship Judge also declined to make a recommendation, under subsection 15(1) of the Act, requesting the Minister to exercise her discretion, under subsection 5(3), to grant citizenship on compassionate grounds or for reasons of special hardship.

The appellant was born in Somalia on July 15, 1967. He arrived in Canada in 1990 and was granted landed immigrant status on June 27, 1991. He appeared before me and answered questions which were directed by the *amicus*

curiae to him. It is evident that the appellant, since appearing before the

Citizenship Judge, has devoted time and effort to study and learn from the

documentation provided by Citizenship Canada. He was able to answer most of

the questions and he has a basic fundamental understanding of the composition of

Canada and its history. The appellant was able to identify the four maritime

provinces, the three prairie provinces and the two largest provinces. He was able

to name the three largest cities in Canada. He was aware of the two official

languages and knew the names of the Prime Minister of Canada and the Premier

of Ontario. He correctly named the federal political parties as well as the

provincial political parties. The appellant was able to identify the rights and

privileges of Canadian citizenship as well as the duties and responsibilities.

I am satisfied that the appellant qualifies for citizenship and that he meets

the requirements of paragraph 5(1)(e) of the Act. Accordingly, the appeal is

allowed.
